INTRO-

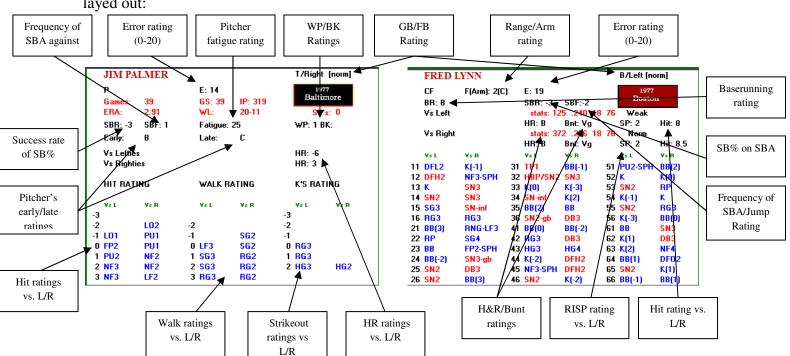

While they enjoyed those games, they always felt something was missing and set about designing their own game. The result, Box Seat Baseball, captures the imagination and features the nuances that make baseball special.

The pitcher/hitter interaction, the focal point of real life baseball, is richly represented with unmatched depth and realism. A truly unique system that blends both hitter AND pitcher tendencies in each confrontation while accounting for a myriad of different variables that keep the gamer completely engaged. Throw in nuances like the heat tiring a starter early, the wind affecting deep flies, starting pitchers performance early and late in the game, hitter's performance with RISP, ground ball/fly ball tendencies along with pull/spray tendencies for hitters, to go with visualization of plays and variety of results on the base paths and in the field keep gamers coming back over and over for more!

This quick reference guide is intended to help rookies and veterans alike with the more common routines found in the Easy Play version of the game.

Let's take a look at a couple of stars from the 1970's and get an idea for how the player cards are layed out:



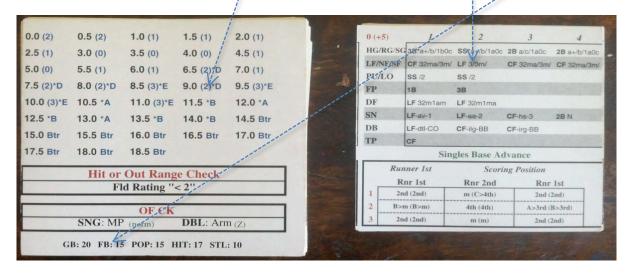

The 2d6 & 1d10 are rolled resulting in a 53 and a 7. Looking at Mays card vs. R we find a RED SN-inf at the 53 position, or a possible infield single. Checking May's hit rating vs. R we find 9.0 and flip the FAC to check for the outcome.

On the FAC at the 9.0 position we find a (2)*D. This means that if it's the 1st inning or the 7th inning on and Newcombe is a D or worse for his EARLY/LATE rating we use May's result. If Newk is a C or better OR if it's the 2-7th inning we check Newk's hit rating vs. R at the (2) spot and find an NF2.

In this case, Newcombe wins the matchup because his EARLY rating is a C and we use the NF2 result. The NF2 becomes a normal fly out to left field (taken from the FAC on the right) with a runner on third having the option to try and score from 3rd. If the d10 had been a 0 we would check for an error on the fly ball using the FB: 15 error rating on the left FAC. Any fielder with an error rating of 14 or less would drop the fly for an error.



Easy Play Range Check Routine

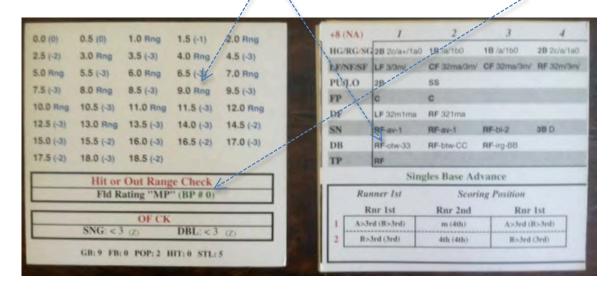


In this at bat the 2d6/1d10 roll comes up 61/3 which we find is a DB1 vs. R on May's card (DB is the symbol for Double). Once again, using May's hit rating vs. R of 9.0 we flip the FAC and check for a result. This time we find 'Rng' at the 9.0 spot, indicating a range check that will determine if the double occurs.'

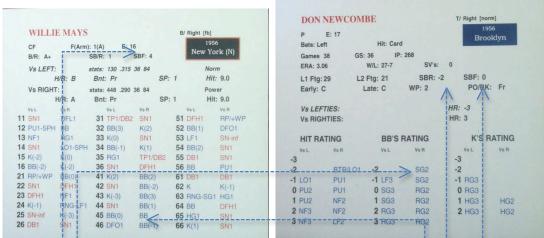
First, we must determine whose range is being challenged so we check the FAC on the right using the DB1 symbol and find Newcombe's right fielder Carl Furillo is being challenged. Furillo was a once a great fielder in his prime, is now a liability with the glove as in a 4 (worst rating) in RF.

Now that we have determined to whom the ball is hit to we flip another FAC (not shown) and check to see if the play is made. Here we find that only a fielder with a rating of 1 (the best) would make the play on this ball and the 'Say Hey Kid' has doubled off the wall in right!

Note: Range results can be altered by the ballpark (optional) using the green result.



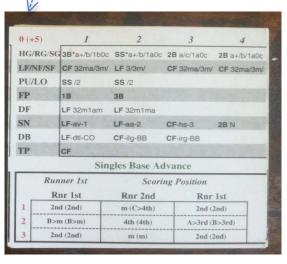
Easy Play Auto SB Routine



Let's re-visit our hit routine example. This time Mays has led off an inning and reached base by rolling a 2d6 result of 45, which is a blue walk result vs. R. Since there is no suffix to the result Newcombe can't block it (looking at Newk's walk ratings vs R he blocks all walk results EXCEPT for those without a suffix).

To determine if Mays steals 2nd, we flip an FAC and refer to the first red number in the upper left hand corner. If after we have subtracted Newcombe's SBF rating from Mays' SBF rating the number is GREATER OR EQUAL to the FAC number, Mays attempts the steal. In this case, Mays is a SBF(4) and Newcombe a SBF(0) meaning that since the 4 is greater than the 0 found on the FAC, Mays takes off for second base.

To determine if Mays is safe, we combine Newcombe's SBR rating of (-2) with Dodger catcher Roy Campanella's arm rating of (C), which equates to a numerical value of 0 and divide by 2, resulting in a pitcher/catcher combination of -1. This is now applied to Mays SBR (1) and we will use an SBR(0) on the stolen base chart which means Mays is safe on a roll of 16-45.

In this at bat Mays rolls a 2d6/1d10 result of 63/0. This results in an HG1, or a hard ground out (often a double play). The ZERO on the d10 also tells us an error check will be in order.

We flip the FAC to see who the HG1 is hit to and find Dodger 2B Jim Gilliam is the fielder. If the d10 had not been a ZERO this would just be a ground out (or a double play if a runner was on first, despite Mays' A+ baserunning rating!). Instead, we need to do a quick check of the left FAC for the minimum error rating on a GB required to NOT make an error; we find a 9 and compare it to Gilliam's error rating of 16 and he's handled the tough smash and made the out. If Gilliam's error rating was < 9 an error would occur. We would re-roll the d10 and consult the infield error description chart to determine how the error was made and where Mays ends up.
